
For those of us who enjoved watching Richard Thomas as "John-Boy" on The Waltons TV series. it's hard for us to grasp that Thomas nearly 66 years grandfather, old, а and a spokesperson for, as well as the National Chairperson of, the Better Hearing Institute.

Diagnosed with cochlear otoschlerosis (a condition that causes permanent sensorineural hearing loss) in his early 30's, "John-Boy" has worn hearing aids for over three decades—a long time by any standard and an eternity for an actor, who depends heavily on good hearing for script cues.



How do allergies impact our hearing? The body's immune system reacts to an allergen (example: pollen) by producing antibodies and causing the release of histamine (a compound that produces secretions in response to the allergen). Histamine can cause inflamed nasal passages, sinuses, and airways. The inflammation results in mucus production which leads to itchy, watery eyes, runny nose or congestion, and sneezing. The excess fluid created by an allergic reaction can also create problems for the ear.

Eustachian tubes function as a drainage passage for the middle ear. The Eustachian tube is a muscular tunnel that opens and closes to both equalize the pressure between the external environment and the middle ear, and to drain debris. These tubes

are connected to the nose and throat. If they become clogged by excess drainage from the nose and/or throat, this fluid can build up in the ears, along with other debris (such as excessive ear wax), causing numerous hearing problems like:

- Fluctuating hearing
- · Middle ear infections and earaches
- · Pressure or a feeling of "fullness"
- · Conductive hearing loss

We don't have any magic cures for allergies. However, here are a few ways we can help you hear better when you are suffering from some of the common allergic reactions. We can:

- Deep-clean your hearing aid(s)
- Check your ears for swelling or debris
- Program your hearing aids to soft, medium and loud settings, giving you control to change the volume as needed, so you can hear more comfortably (This is a typical response, depending on the type/ style/technology level of your instruments.)
- Provide you with plenty of wax filters so you can change them often
